CRC is the **3rd** leading cause of cancer death.

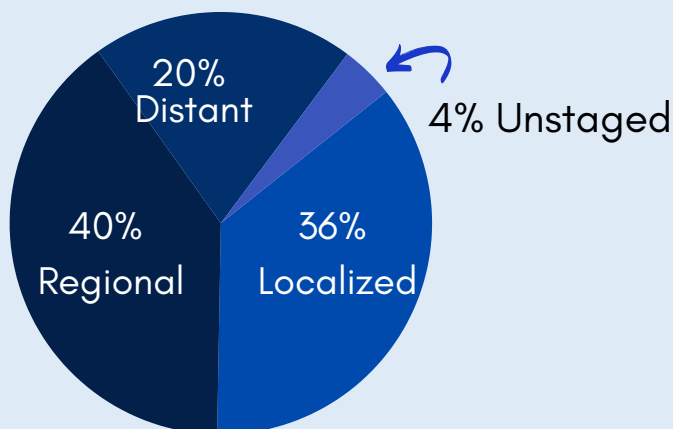
The 5-year relative survival is **67.5%**.²

Maine ranks **8th** highest in the US for CRC 5-year survival rate.³

Risk Factors

- Age
- Poor diet
- Obesity
- Physical inactivity
- Smoking
- Alcohol consumption

Nearly **9 in 10**



people diagnosed at a localized stage will survive at least 5 years (vs 2 in 10 at a distant stage).⁵

* In 2021, CRC screening recommendations changed from screening at age 50 to screening at age 45.

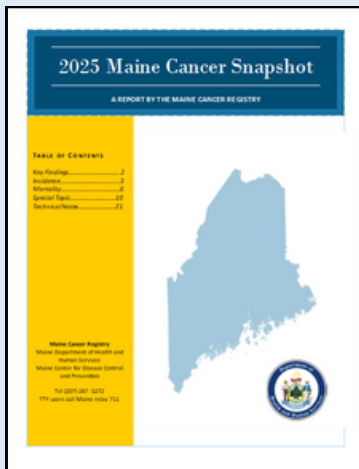
MAINE CDC CANCER REGISTRY (MCR)

The MCR collects information about all newly diagnosed cancers in Maine residents to better understand cancer, identify areas in need of public health interventions, and improve cancer prevention, treatment, and control.

MAINE CDC COLORECTAL CANCER CONTROL PROGRAM

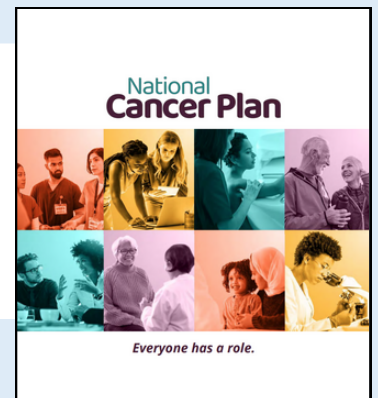
The purpose of the MCRCCP is to increase colorectal cancer screening rates among Maine residents between 45–75 years of age. Our program works with participating federally qualified health centers to use and strengthen strategies that have been shown to increase colorectal cancer screening, called evidence-based interventions.
